Let's Be Conservative, Liberal and Progressive

What do you want to see in 2023? I look for Faith Lutheran Church to be *conservative, liberal* and *progressive* ... as long we understand these terms together.

Let's be *conservative*. To conserve is "to save, to preserve, to protect" that which is vital. King David warned about those who fight God's righteousness, "When the foundations are being destroyed, what can the righteous do?" (Psalm 11:3). He urges us to be *conservative* in regard to God's standards. Our congregation is committed to the Bible as "the divinely inspired, revealed, and inerrant Word of God and the only infallible authority in all matters of faith and life." We may not agree about everything, but we begin and end with the Bible as our authority.

Sometimes people act conservatively in ways that the Bible does not support. *Conservative* is also defined as "disposed to preserve existing conditions ... to limit change." Throughout history, people have expressed opinions, conservative in this sense of the word, that appeared silly later on. "If God had intended for men to fly, he would have created them with wings." Sometimes Christians are conservative with ill will; the Christian school movement surged in the South in 1960s and 1970s as white Christians established schools to avoid having their children attend school with Black students.

Let's be *conservative* by preserving what is vital. Let's not blindly preserve existing conditions.

Let's be *liberal* – marked by generosity. In fact, James describes God as liberal, in the New King James Version: "If any of you lacks wisdom, let him ask of God, who gives to all liberally and without reproach, and it will be given to him" (James 1:5). Many translations use "generous" here. You have worked with stingy – and perhaps even greedy – people. That is how some people think of churches. May that never be true of our congregation!

Unfortunately, *liberal* can also mean "lacking moral restraint ... not bound by ... orthodoxy (the Bible)" We will not allow Faith to slip into this rut.

Let's be *liberal* in the sense of generous.

Let's be *progressive* – "making use of or interested in new ideas, findings, or opportunities." One hundred years ago, churches used the technology of a physical sign to help people find their church. Then they added an entry in the yellow pages. As society shifted from the yellow pages to the internet, so did we. And now, we have adopted new technology in our sign facing the highway. We are committed to "inviting all people to faith." We will be progressive to accomplish that.

We will not jump on the progressive bandwagon when it steps away from the Bible – "favorable to progress or reform in … religious affairs." Pouring poison into a pop bottle does not make it less dangerous. If anything, the situation becomes more dangerous. The label *progressive* can be attached to almost anything – even unbiblical notions.


We will measure everything by the Bible. We will discuss, we will pray, and we will make decisions together. We will aim at healthy *progress*.

Starting Anew

As 2023 begins, we realize that once again, we are allowed to renew our strength. With the anticipation of what the next year will bring, comes the promise from Isaiah 40:31, *"But those who hope in the Lord will renew their strength. They will soar on wings like eagles. They will run and not*

grow weary. They will walk and not be faint."


Weariness can take many forms. Combined with the winter weather that tends to isolate many of us, this season tends to challenge our emotional well-being. Depression and anxiety tend to displace strength with feelings of despair, helplessness, and hopelessness. This weariness can be abated to some extent by maintaining a routine (i.e., getting plenty of rest, exercise, eating healthily, going to bed and getting up at the same time etc.) to combat the lethargy of this time of year.

More significant mental health conditions, such as schizophrenia, bipolar illness, and some forms of major depression disorder, can result in an increase of cyclical symptoms because of seasonal changes. With these illnesses, the mind tries to "make sense" of stressors through responses that are not always in touch with the reality of their circumstances.

The use of a Wellness Recovery Action Plan (WRAP) plan can help identify early intervention strategies to give individuals and their families tools to manage these situations safely and possibly avert a behavioral health crisis. We, as Christians, can thankfully say we have access to an eternal wellness plan. As Ecclesiastes 3:11 reminds us, *"He has made everything beautiful in its time. He has also set eternity in the human heart; yet no one can fathom what God has done from beginning to end."* Let us begin this new year with the expectancy and hope filled with more beautiful moments and a lasting peace.

The new year is a natural time when many people reflect on the past year, while looking forward to what is to come. Some people also choose to create New Year's resolutions for themselves, pinpointing one or a few areas in which they want to change or grow. Some want to have a healthier lifestyle; others feel the need to spend less and save more, or perhaps they resolve to hold better boundaries going forward. Even if you're not one to set resolutions on New Year's, as Christians we are continually called to allow our lives to be molded by God's grace into the people God has made us to be.

Inevitably, however, we fall short. Perhaps we laid an old habit on the altar, only to take it back up again. Perhaps we are determined to pray daily, only to discover that a week has gone by and our prayer life is left wanting. Of course, this is part of being human. Even the Apostle Paul talked about his struggle in doing what he didn't want to do – and not doing what he wanted to do – in the book of Romans. What should our response be when we find ourselves in such a position?

As followers of God, we turn back to the One who makes change possible – and Who is doing the very molding of our hearts. The song I quoted above describes this dance perfectly. It is easy for us to forget or ignore the voice of God – yet God never forgets us or leaves our side. Though we are unfaithful, Christ remains faithful (2 Timothy 2:13). No matter our flaws or failures, we are cradled in God's arms, and it is there that we receive God's perfect, lasting peace. Once we are fully aware that we remain surrounded by God's love, we realize we never needed to *do* anything. We simply need Jesus.

Rest in God's arms, even if only for a moment. Don't worry about what needs doing, past failures, or other distractions. Simply rest, feel God's presence, and let God remind you of what truly matters: that God loves you, and you love God; that you need God in your life, and God will provide everything you need. In this new year, come back to this reassurance, and know that you are loved.




December's Highlights by Radina Jansen

LCMC's 11th Annual 3 Days of Prayer

There are times the Holy Spirit takes what some people have been ignoring or only engaging in by rote, breathes fresh life into it, and uses it to pull us into the current of God's plans for our lives. An illustration of this is the ancient prayer and practice of The Lord's Prayer.

This year, we're going to take that ancient prayer and practice of the Church and put it to use in LCMC's Three Days of Prayer. As we pray together as individuals, congregations, and as one international association, I believe the Lord is going to use what we pray in this ancient prayer to pull us into the current of the plans and purposes He has for us in the present and in the future.

LCMC's Three Days of Prayer will be on January 3-5. Each congregation or person can structure these days of prayer however seems best. In the past, some congregations put together a prayer vigil- – a person signing up to pray in 30-minute intervals – perhaps for all three days or a few hours each day. Others have offered a prayer service at a set hour on each of the three days. Some have encouraged their people simply to pray at work, home, or school, wherever they are, and whatever they are doing.

This year, I am encouraging us all to use the Lord's Prayer as an outline to pray for our congregations and leaders, for those who don't yet know Jesus as Savior and Lord, and for our international partners. Praying the Lord's prayer as an outline can give form to our prayers and provide space for us to pray according to each petition for the churches or people we are focused on that day.

Pray each petition one at a time, then pause and pay attention to what comes to mind. Then pray out of those thoughts or impressions. For instance, pray "Our Father who art in heaven, hallowed be Thy name," and pause. Then pray words and thoughts of thanks to God for being your Father, for His love, and for His goodness toward you. Glorify His name in prayer.

Then pray the second petition, "Thy Kingdom come, Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven," and pause. Think of how you would love to see God's Kingdom life break in on those you are praying for, and then pray for them. Pray for



relationships, emotions, or bodies to be healed. Pray for someone to become aware of God's love for them. Pray for peace in someone's life or in a region. And so on. Continue to pray each petition one at a time, pausing to listen to thoughts, scriptures, and impressions that come to mind, and then pray for that church, that person.

No matter how you structure this time of prayer, let's come together as an association of congregations across the U.S. and around the world to pray. Check out our Three Days of Prayer Resources page (<u>www.lcmc.net/3dop-</u> <u>resources/538</u>) page to download a sample guide.

Day One: For Our Congregations and Leaders

"Lord, we pray that You bless our congregations and leaders with Your favor and with Your provision and power to carry out the ministry and mission You have in store for us. In Jesus' name, we pray. Amen."

What can God do through almost 1,000 congregations in the United States and overseas? How many people can He impact with His love and His power through the tens of thousands of members in the churches of LCMC? Wouldn't it be wonderful if our testimony in the years to come is that God was at work in and through our association, drawing millions of people to faith in Jesus as Savior and Lord? Discipling millions of people to live as followers of Jesus? Filling millions of people with the empowering presence of the Holy Spirit? Healing millions of people physically, emotionally, and relationally as well as setting others free from whatever held them captive?

As I have said before, this is not hyperbole. This is in fact what God can do in and through our association in the coming years. It is what can happen as the Holy Spirit empowers us to live lives of witness (Acts 1:8), serve as ambassadors for the kingdom of God who have a message of life to proclaim (2 Corinthians 5:20) and God-

stories to share (1 Peter 3:15). With that in mind, let us pray for God's provision and empowerment upon the members, leaders, and churches of Lutheran Congregations in Mission for Christ.

Let us pray for new congregations in LCMC to be welcomed and connected in relationships with other congregations and leaders in the association and in their regions of the country. Let us pray for provision: provision of people. Provision of just the right relationships in our communities at just the right time. Provision of finances for ministry and mission. Provision of favor with community leaders and with those who do not yet know Jesus as Savior and Lord. Provision of training resources to equip God's people for what the Lord wants to do in us and through us. Provision of spiritual gifts that can help us impact others with God's love and God's power. Provision of the joy and boldness to share our God stories that come through the empowering presence of the Holy Spirit being stirred within us.

Day Two: For Those Who Don't Yet Know Jesus as Savior and Lord, and For the Prodigals

"Lord, give us Your heart for those who don't yet know you as Savior and Lord, and for the prodigals. Create in us a boldness to love them and serve them and to share our God-stories with them as opportunities arise. Open our eyes to be aware of everyday encounters in which we can minister Your love and Your power to those in need. In Jesus' name we pray. Amen."

We know that our Lord Jesus came to seek and to save the lost (Luke 19:10, ESV). And we know that our Heavenly Father is a father who joyfully welcomes home the prodigals. Today, let's pray that God will bring us together as one across our

association in praying that millions might be drawn to a relationship of love for and faith in Jesus as Savior and Lord.

Let's also pray that the Lord might bring home the prodigals who have walked away from a life of faith in Him. Lord, bring home our spouses, bring home our sons

and daughters and grandchildren. Lord, bring home our friends and neighbors. Let's pray that God might set them free from any woundedness or deception that has driven them away from their relationship with Him. Let's pray that they might experience God's love and acceptance and affirmation as His beloved daughters and sons.

Day Three: For Our International Partners

"Thank You, Lord, that You have bound us together with these sister churches and leaders and partner networks. We pray that You will give them protection and provision. We pray that You will show us how we can come alongside them, encourage them, and serve with them. Lord, grant our brothers and sisters Your favor in their cities, communities, and countries. We pray this in Jesus' name. Amen."

We are blessed as an association to not only have sister churches here in the United States but also sister churches and partner networks in fifteen other countries around the world. Together we are involved in the mission of the gospel that God has called us to and equips us for through the empowering presence of the Holy Spirit.

In Acts 1:8 Jesus says: "But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you, and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth." It is with and through our international partners that we are being empowered by God to live out this reality of being witnesses of what God has done in and through the life, death, and resurrection of His Son, our Lord, and Savior, Jesus Christ. It is with and through our international partners we are enabled by God to live these lives of witness locally, regionally, and throughout entire countries.

Let us pray for God's protection and provision for our sisters and brothers in other nations. Let us pray for God's leading in how He would have us reach out to them and partner with them in the coming year. Let us pray for God's provision of food, medicine, clean water, and safety where these are needed. Let us pray for the empowering presence of the Holy Spirit to fill our sisters and brothers afresh and grant them God's favor as they give witness to the gospel of Jesus Christ in their cities, communities, and countries.

Via de Cristo ... What is that?

"By grace, with the Holy Spirit, we challenge leaders to discover and achieve their personal calling, assisting them to influence their environments with the Gospel."

What is Via de Cristo?

Via de Cristo is a Spanish phrase meaning "Way of Christ." Via de Cristo is a highly structured three day weekend designed to strengthen and renew the faith of Christian people and bring them to a new awareness of living in God's grace. It is a combined effort of lay people and clergy toward renewal of the church.

History of Via de Cristo

The movement originated as "Cursillo" in the late 1940's in the Spanish Catholic church and moved to the United States in the late 1950's. It began in the Lutheran church when lay people and clergy attended a Catholic Cursillo in 1971, both in Iowa and Florida. The first Lutheran sponsored weekends were held in 1972 in Iowa and Florida and have now been held in over 25 states and some foreign countries. Via de Cristo is the Lutheran expression of this method which is currently being used in many denominations including: Episcopal, Methodist, Presbyterian and Reformed churches.

Purpose of Via de Cristo

Via de Cristo is based on the fundamentals of Christianity, concentrating on the person and teachings of Jesus Christ. The focus is not on Via de Cristo itself, but on the environment of the community of believers. The objective of the movement is to inspire, challenge and equip people for Christian action in their homes, churches and communities.

What happens on a Via de Cristo weekend?

A Via de Cristo weekend is three days in length, beginning on Thursday evening and ending the following Sunday evening. The participants live, study, worship and commune together daily. Fourteen talks are given, nine by lay people and five by clergy. Following each talk, small round table discussions focus on the main points of the talk and a poster is done.

Who should attend a Via de Cristo weekend?

Via de Cristo is intended for lay people from every walk of life, for pastors, for people who live strong and active lives in Christ, and also for those who seek to be renewed and strengthened in their relationship with Christ and the people around them. Via de Cristo is open to married couples, and single men and women.

Summary

Keep an open mind and heart in making your decision to attend Via de Cristo. Many of those who have attended also wondered whether they should go.
