March at Faith begins with **Ash Wednesday** on March 2 at 6:30 p.m. There will be no evening meal. This evening will be a time of gathering and reflection on the footsteps and sacrifices of our Lord and Savior these next few weeks.

Lenten devotionals are available on the Welcome Center, bulletin tables, and in the Devotionals Box outside. This year, the devotional booklet, "in view of God's Mercy", is written by theology professor David Boyd.

Mid-week Lent meals begin on March 9. The meal is provided. A free-will offering will help defray meal expenses. The Fellowship Team requests to hear from those who wish to attend the meals. See the information on page 5 to communicate your desire to attend. Be sure to stay after the meal to worship and enjoy a message by a guest speaker.

March 13 marks another step to spring with **Daylight Saving Time**. Remember to set your clocks forward one hour!

First Communion is an important time in a child's life. Classes at Faith begin on Sunday, March 20 during the Sunday School hour. Please see the article on page 17 for further information.

Teacher in-service day at Spencer Schools means all-day LifeKids at Faith. Radina plans a fun and full day for the children. The church is abuzz with activity, and it is heartening to know the children are in a safe place learning about Jesus and gaining life skills.

For Ash Wednesday - and throughout the 40 days of Lent - ponder this prayer from an Italian sacramentary, or liturgical book: "O God, you know how fragile is our human nature, wounded as it is by sin. Help your people to enter upon the Lenten journey strengthened by the power of your word, so that we may be victorious over the seduction of the Evil One and reach the paschal feast in the joy of the Holy Spirit."

- 9. Write a letter to a political leader about a faith-related issue.
- 10. Give a financial gift to someone you know is in need.
- 11. Contribute to a Christian ministry.
- 12. Comfort the mourning with food, presence and prayer.
- 13. Clear out the closets of excessive clothes or toys that can be donated to charity.
- 14. Invite someone to worship with you, and to share a meal afterward.
- 15. Plan meatless meals.
- 16. Give up a time fritterer—surfing the net, shopping, television, telephone.
- 17. Pray about and seek reconciliation with estranged family and friends.
- 18. Pray daily for people who are suffering.
- 19. Visit the sick, the elderly or the imprisoned.
- 20. Fast from the cell phone or computer for scheduled time windows.
- 21. Fast from certain television/entertainment screens or programming.
- 22. Match extra spending in charitable giving.
- 23. Refresh yourself in the Catechism.
- 24. Adopt a daily examination of conscience and confession.
- 25. Offer up the most hated chore you have to God, performing it with a cheerful heart.
- 26. Say "I love you" daily to each person in your family.
- 27. Refrain from unpleasant, catty or snarky comments—even in your head.
- 28. Abstain from a favorite activity like Instagram, Snapchat, Facebook, or Twitter.
- 29. Go to the gym or exercise regularly as an offering.
- 30. Write to a friend about your faith.
- 31. Volunteer for Meals on Wheels or some other service activity.
- 32. Add a new prayer time to your daily schedule.
- 33. Begin reading the Bible or a devotional.
- 34. Fast from fast food or a particular food.
- 35. Share a Bible verse, a devotional thought or a spiritual question daily with a friend or with your family.

MEET YOUR MISSIONS: FRIENDS OF MADAGASCAR MISSIONS



Madagascar is the world's fourth largest island and is located just east of the African continent. In 1866 Norwegian missionaries founded a Lutheran church there which grew over the years to become the Malagasy Lutheran Church. Friends of Madagascar Missions (FOMM) raises funds and works with this church federation to identify projects needing support to spread the gospel of Jesus and help people in poverty. Current projects that FOMM is supporting are a Bible school for evangelists, a hospital nutrition feeding center, a prison ministry, and a drip irrigation project.

Evangelism is at the heart of the Malagasy Lutheran Church. Currently 41% of the country's population is Christian, 7% is Muslim and 52% is animist (natural religion, ancestors/spirits control their daily life). The evangelists are responsible for reaching out to areas where the people have not yet heard the Gospel of Jesus Christ. The evangelist works in remote areas where there may not be any Christians and witnesses to the Faith through teaching and preaching. The evangelists are eager to begin their ministry in the small villages after completing their two years of study at a Bible School. They visit many villages in the surrounding area where they live. They teach, preach and even teach the villagers in many cases how to read. In three months they visited 1,979 families to share the Gospel with them, which resulted in 608 children and 300 adults being baptized.

Financial support is needed for the evangelists and their families because of the poverty in the region. In addition the evangelists are working in villages that have no believing community and so there are no Christians to provide their financial support. Currently FOMM supports 54 evangelists and prays that will grow to 60 evangelists by year's end. The cost for this is \$700 a year per evangelist. Not everyone in Madagascar can afford to seek out health care. When the average income is \$300 a year, any expense for health care is more than they can afford. So FOMM began a program to provide the evangelists and their families with an insurance coverage of \$100 a year that is adequate in most situations.

Of course donors can also choose to support any of the FOMM programs such as the Bible schools or hospital feeding centers. In the last two months, two hurricanes have hit the island. There is great need also for relief funds to help those without food and shelter. Mission Emphasis: Mental Health Conditions



Life can be hard to manage. As sinners in a fallen world, no one is exempt from the need for God's grace and deliverance. Sometimes, when life is particularly intense, an escape from the emotional rollercoaster may seem to be in order. Sorting through the diversions that may belittle, condemn, spread doubt, or despair over our life call for Christ-centered discernment.


Could it be easier, however, to immerse ourselves in less than healthy activities that help us forget or attempt to ease our pain? It's common for our culture to encourage use of alcohol and other substances (legal and illegal) to provide relief. Life, unfortunately, can get more complicated if we have mental health conditions and choose to use legal or illegal substances to counteract negative symptoms. According to research, 37.9% who use substances have mental illness and 18.2 % with a mental health condition have a substance abuse disorder (nida.nih 2018).

The toll of mental health conditions along with substance abuse, can weaken our resolve to handle stressors God's way. We are told in Isaiah 41:10, "So do not fear, for I am with you; do not be dismayed, for I am your God. I will strengthen you and help you; I will uphold you with my righteous right hand."

With God's help, we can intentionally identify and use effective, positive coping skills to manage stress

"I'll bring you more than a song, for a song in itself is not what you have required..." (*Heart of Worship*, Matt Redman)

What's the first thing that comes to mind when you hear or see the word "worship"? Is it Sunday mornings at church? KLOVE? Bowing down to something or someone? For me, I generally think of worship as music- songs sung to praise, glorify, and connect with God. All of the examples I listed *are* forms of worship, but I think there's a bigger picture we often miss.

I'm a runner. A few months ago, I ran my first marathon, and I'm training for a second one this spring. Imagine if I went on only one run per week. On every other day of the week, I don't take time to exercise, I don't care about my nutrition, and really just put my marathon training in the back of my mind, not giving it much attention. Let me tell you, that race isn't going to go very well with this approach. I could probably do it, but it would be painful and challenging and I wouldn't progress very much in my fitness.

This is often how we approach worship. We spend one hour a week, or maybe two, within the walls of the church building, sing a few songs, pray a few prayers, and call it good for the week. We did our spiritual duty. We got our "fill." And then we go back to our routines and our responsibilities, letting God slide to the back burner of our minds until next Sunday's worship service. We think of worship as a "time and place" sort of thing. But I think God wants our worship to be much broader than that. I believe He desires for us to treat worship as our lifestyle.

Matt Redman's song *Heart of Worship* starts out, "When the music fades, all is stripped away, and I simply come." **When the music fades.** That's convicting for me. I love connecting with God through music, and it's not that God doesn't love to hear our sung praises to Him... it's just that worship is more inclusive than that. Worship is anything that brings God glory. 1 Corinthians 10:31 says, "So whether you eat or drink or whatever you do, do it all for the glory of God." We can worship God in

anything and everything we do, and we should. The chorus of the song repeats, "it's all about you, Jesus." Every aspect of our lives is designed to be all about Him.

Everything I do during the week should be moving me forward in my marathon training: what I eat, how much I sleep, the amount of water I drink, how much I exercise, and so on. I can tell when I have made a choice that doesn't push me toward my goals, and I don't feel as good. In a similar way, everything we do during the week should be a form of worship such that our Sunday mornings are not solely what we are dependent on to sustain our relationship with our Heavenly Father, who is worthy of our every breath. I challenge and encourage you this week to worship God every day, practicing giving Him glory in everything you do.



One family is having to borrow a vehicle in order to pick up their children from the church, because their car no longer runs. If no arrangements can be made, the children can't attend on those days. Another family has a car that hasn't worked consistently since November. If the schedules of working family members doesn't allow them to be home at 5:30, the child cannot attend. A third family has two cars without heat. There are younger siblings at home, so when it's too cold, this child cannot attend.

I would like to thank Randy and Barb Enge for being so kind and giving of their time! Randy takes one of the LifeKids home every day after he gets off work. The little girl wanted to go to Sunday School, so Barb and Randy bring her to church on Sunday and take her home after Sunday school!

If you would like to assist in driving a child or 2 siblings home from LifeKids on an as needed basis, let me know and I will put you in touch with the family.


Escape room teamwork! The children have finished 2 out of the 4 mystery puzzles. It's been inspiring to watch the children work together in groups. They are reminding each other of facts related to Moses and the 10 plagues that they have learned. There are 2 groups and they have used different strategies to crack the code to solve each mystery puzzle. It's been difficult for me not to jump in and assist, but I've refrained and it's so rewarding to observe their problem-solving skills!







A big LifeKids, "Thank you!" goes out to Lori Krei for the use of her Thrivent Action Team card. In October, when we stopped in Sheldon after our field trip to a pumpkin patch, the children found rocks hidden in the park. One of the children suggested that we make others smile by painting rocks and then hiding them. We started working on the rocks on our full day on February 22nd. Unique rock kits were purchased. The Hydro Dip Rocks were a real hit as some children are hesitant to paint.









A big LifeKids, "Thank you!" goes out to Bry at the Dickinson County Conservation Center for being so flexible! Bry and I began communicating at 6:14 the morning of our field trip. There had been freezing drizzle the night before. We decided to move our morning field trip to the afternoon, keeping an eye on the weather. We safely arrived and enjoyed our time learning and exploring!

They got to meet Sy the salamander and Steven the bearded dragon. They had an opportunity to touch each of them if they chose to. They compared and contrasted Sy and Steven. They learned that Sy is an amphibian, a carnivore (only eats meat) and that Steven is a reptile, an omnivore (eats both plants and meat).

They also got to meet a Madagascar hissing cockroach. Let's just say they were more interested in the salamander and bearded dragon!

When we were at the pumpkin patch in October, we touched a little bit on the need for pollination. There were beehives near the pumpkin patch. Bry did a lesson which included a pollination activity in which the children were pollinators. They each had a bucket (the flower) and pompoms of assorted colors and sizes, (the pollen). They were to move to one flower, take out one pollen, return to their flower and put the pollen in their flower. They were given directions as how to move, (fly, hop, skip, shuffle, crawl, etc). This got them moving and they had lots of fun. After collecting pollen, they talked about how much pollen they had started with in their flower and how much was in their flower at the end of their gathering. Brycen only had one pompom left and discovered that that could mean that his flower was very well liked. Bryatt had a lot of pompoms and that could mean that he was a very busy pollinator.

Bry read them a story about the reason for a flower. They then matched pollinators to flowers by reading the description of what kind of flower each pollinator likes. We were surprised to learn that ants and bats are pollinators!

After the learning activities, the children had an opportunity to continue to learn through free play.

Ash Wednesday Stewardship by Rev. Robert Blezard

"Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return."

With these ancient words from Genesis 3:19 and the swipe of a dirty thumb across our foreheads, Ash Wednesday propels us into Lent with the proper context to understand our lives as stewards of the riches God entrusts to us.

The essential teaching of Ash Wednesday – that we are just mortals, after all – crushes our ego, dispels our pretentions, and drives us deep into God's mysteries. Why are we here? What are our lives all about? What's really important? Pray over these questions as profound insights emerge.

We are dust. Yes, but we are God's dust. Our body consists of trillions of atoms, each a speck of "dust" created by God, billions of years ago. God put us together from the stuff of the universe.

- Therefore, we are quite literally "earthy" beings, made of the same material as air, water, soil and stone. Part of creation, we work to preserve and sustain God's creation for future generations.
- Therefore, we revere and care for our bodies through healthy living.

We are breath. We are not only dust. Genesis 2:7 describes us as "dust" into which God has

"breathed the Holy breath of life." Our lives are the breath of God in our dust.

- Therefore, every breath we take is holy, a prayer that whispers God's praise.
- Therefore, we look to God to align our lives with God's holy reality that arcs towards peace, love, joy, justice, and truth.

Our time is brief. The "dust" that is us will return to the earth. We have a finite number of minutes.

- Therefore, every hour, every second is sacred. There is not a single moment to waste. We spend our time wisely, carefully, prayerfully.
- Therefore, we do not cling to our possessions, knowing that we will leave it all behind.
- Therefore, we nourish our lives with lasting treasures relationships, trust, love, joy, service, generosity, and harmony.

This Lent spend time in prayer, with openness and honesty. See how God will transform you into the person you were created to be. Reflect each day like it is Ash Wednesday. "Remember you are dust, and to dust you shall return."
