Toining Tesus on His Mission

When I first wrote to Faith's Call Committee in 2021, I described my ministry like this, "God uses me to renew a congregation by **encouraging the committed** and **engaging spectators** so that together we may fulfill a congregation's mission to **welcome new people to Jesus."**

God has brought many people to join us in worshiping and serving together—57 new members in the last two years. Several of our newer members are participating in a small group or a Bible study. Several of our recent and long-term members have stepped into new roles in ministry and serving on a new ministry team. I rejoice in God's work among us!

Yet the words in our giant cross out front cry out to me: "Inviting all People to Faith. Come and worship. Go and work." "Inviting all people to faith" echoes the heartbeat of Jesus:

- "Go home to your own people and <u>tell them how much the Lord has done</u> for you, and how He has had mercy on you." (Mark 5:19).
- "Suppose one of you has a hundred sheep and loses one of them. Doesn't he leave the ninety-nine in the open country and go after the lost sheep until he finds it?" (Luke 15:4)
- "Jesus said, 'Peace be with you! As the Father has sent me, <u>I am sending</u> <u>you</u>.'" (John 20:21-22).

In 2024, I call on you to participate in the first part of our declaration: "Inviting all people to faith."

What does this look like? It may sound daunting, but we are surrounded by people who are open to hearing about Jesus! Last week I attended a school concert and introduced myself to the man sitting next to me. I asked if he had a child in the concert. He pointed out his daughter in the choir. I asked if she got her singing ability more from him or Mom. He laughed and said, "Mom, definitely, but I sing in the shower."

We talked about work and weather and who knows what else. I never told him that I'm a pastor, but I said, "Since your family likes music, you would enjoy the Christmas Eve Candlelight Service at my church."

"Where's your church?" he asked.

Since his wife is a Spencer native, I asked her, "Do you know where Shopper's Supply was?" When she nodded her head, I said, "That's my church, Faith Lutheran."

The concert began. We enjoyed the music, clapped in between songs, and when it was finished, we stood up to leave. The dad and I shook hands, and when we said goodbye, he added, "We're going to visit your church."

Jesus will guide you and me ... if we are willing to open our mouths. We are surrounded by people who are eager to hear about Jesus.

Welcome To The Unknown

Have you ever been with a kid at a restaurant (or maybe you've been the kid at a restaurant)? When it comes time to order, what will they choose to eat? Are they more likely to order something new and unusual they've never had before, or are they more likely to order something familiar, like chicken nuggets? If the kid you're thinking of is anything



like most kids, they probably stuck to the tried and true chicken nuggets.

But the truth is, it's not just kids that stick with what they already know works. Adults do too; maybe even more so than kids. Parents often try to get their kids to try new foods, or new activities, or make new friends. Kids go through a lot of changes in their young lives, in part because their parents encourage them to, and in part because that's part of growing up and discovering who they are and who God made them to be. Sometimes adults forget that trying new things can be a beautiful way to discover a deeper part of life and how God is moving and working in the world around us.


Laura Story (who you may best know for her song, "Blessings") wrote the song "Hello Unknown" a few years ago. Much like a kid ordering chicken nuggets, she speaks to how much easier life is when we follow the same routine as always - but then speaks to God and sings, "You call me to mystery." As the song unfolds, Laura sings how often God wants to use the new, unfamiliar, and unknown to refine us, deepen our faith, and cause us to trust Him more fully. As Laura writes, when we relinquish control and embrace the great unknown God has for us, we can "free fall into faith." This step may seem scary, but that's okay. It's part of the process.

The start of the new year is often filled with anticipation, and perhaps making a resolution or two. While there's certainly nothing wrong with making goals for yourself this year, what if you embraced the unknown? Rather than deciding what you're going to improve something this year, what if you asked God to lead you into mystery? And what if you trusted God enough to take the first step into a path that seems completely covered in mist?

I can't predict where God will take you. But I can guarantee that God will lead you to Himself. Let's step out of our comfort zone, and embrace wherever God leads us. Together, let's sing, "Hello Unknown".

Projector Replacement Proposal

The Council and I have been working with RDI to develop a replacement plan for our aging projector system. Our current system is aging and we are doing our best to be proactive in looking at what options we have moving forward before the state of our current system becomes critical over the next several years. We are planning on having a more detailed discussion about this project at the forum in January, but wanted to inform the congregation of the proposed project at this time to allow time for members to think of questions and have discussions with those of us involved. RDI has developed several proposals ranging from roughly \$60,000 - \$80,000 depending on number of projectors, use of projector screens, and a few other minor details. This will be a special project separate from the annual budget. Anyone who is interested in learning more details on this project, please feel free to talk to either myself or Joe Simington.

LCMC's 3 Days of Prayer

Prayer was a holy habit practiced by Jesus Himself (see Mark 1:35; Luke 11:1). The disciples who walked alongside Him witnessed a connection between His public life and ministry, and this habit of prayer. It was a connection so significant, that they asked Jesus to teach them to pray (Luke 11:1).

LCMC's Three Days of Prayer on January 2-4 is an opportunity for us to follow the Lord's example and to come together as one across the association with a shared purpose: to pray.

Day One: Pray for Our Congregations and Leaders

"Lord, we pray that You bless our congregations and leaders with Your favor and with Your provision and power to carry out the ministry and mission You have in store for us. In Jesus' name, we pray. Amen."

What can God do through almost 1,000 congregations in the United States and overseas? How many people can He impact with His love and His power through the tens of thousands of members in the churches of LCMC? Wouldn't it be wonderful if our testimony in the years to come, is that God was at work in and through our association, drawing millions of people to faith in Jesus as Savior and Lord?

Let us pray for provision: Provision of the joy and boldness to share our God stories that come through the empowering presence of the Holy Spirit being stirred within us.

Day Two: For Those Who Don't Yet Know Jesus as Savior and Lord, and For the Prodigals

"Lord, give us Your heart for those who don't yet know you as Savior and Lord, and for the prodigals. Create in us a boldness to love them and serve them and to share our God-stories with them as opportunities arise. Open our eyes to be aware of everyday encounters in which we can minister Your love and Your power to those in need. In Jesus' name we pray. Amen."

Today, let's pray that God will bring us together as one across our association in praying that millions might be drawn to a relationship of love for and faith in Jesus as Savior and Lord. Let's also pray that the Lord might bring home the prodigals who have walked away from a life of faith in the Him. Lord, bring home our spouses, bring home our sons and daughters and grandchildren. Lord, bring home our friends and neighbors.

Let's pray that God might set them free from any woundedness or deception that has driven them away from their relationship with Him. Let's pray that they might experience God's love and acceptance and affirmation as His beloved daughters and sons.

Day Three: For Our International Partners

"Thank You, Lord, that You have bound us together with these sister churches and leaders and partner networks. We pray that You will give them protection and provision. We pray that You will show us how we can come alongside them, encourage them, and serve with them. Lord, grant our brothers and sisters Your favor in their cities, communities, and countries. We pray this in Jesus' name. Amen."

In Acts 1:8 Jesus says: "But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you, and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth." It is with and through our international partners that we are being empowered by God to live out this reality of being witnesses of what God has done in and through the life, death, and resurrection of His Son, our Lord, and Savior, Jesus Christ. It is with and through our international partners we are enabled by God to live these lives of witness locally, regionally, and throughout entire countries.

Let us pray for God's protection and provision for our sisters and brothers in other nations. Let us pray for God's leading in how He would have us reach out to them and partner with them in the coming year. Let us pray for God's provision of food, medicine, clean water, and safety where these are needed. Let us pray for the empowering presence of the Holy Spirit to fill our sisters and brothers afresh and grant them God's favor as they give witness to the gospel of Jesus Christ in their cities, communities, and countries.



Here we are again at the beginning of a new year. For some, last year was a blur of memories, filled with occasions that could easily be remembered or forgotten, depending on one's perspective. For all of us, we launch a new year that has promise as it unfolds. The following may be fundamental questions this time of year. Will I look expectantly to the future? Will I revel in the present and make the best of my Godgiven days? Will I be burdened by the past?

As Christians, we are reminded that "If anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation" (2 Corinthians 5:17). What a wonderful gift God has given to us in the form of His Son, our Savior. This passage ignites a thought process in us to determine and choose our unique form of how God's will can be played out in our lives. We know we are fortified with our belief we belong to Christ. We also realize we must depend on the Holy Spirit to guide our paths to reach God's standard of Christian living.

What does that look like for this coming year as we venture into the uncertainty of the future? Paul tells us: "You were taught, with regard to your former way of life, to put off your old self, which is being corrupted by its deceitful desires; to be made new in the attitude of your minds; and to put on the new self, created to be like God in true righteousness and holiness" (Ephesians 4:22-24).

You may ask, how do we abandon our tendencies to negatively assess our world and our abilities to gain "true righteousness and holiness." Our mental and emotional health is an important battleground for these principles to take root and thrive. When we are challenged by malice, ill will, and bitterness, our responses can be replaced by love and forgiveness of one's self and others.

Intentional thought life skills (setting measurable goals, establishing a daily routine, strengthening relationships, decluttering our space, reducing "wasted" time etc.) serve as stress relievers and sharpen our sense of purpose. These healthy habits can help our well-being while getting us closer to our relationship with God as we separate ourselves from the world and the Enemy's distractions. We must also remember we are not alone and reach out to trusted confidantes to gain strength and resolve.

Our breastplate of righteousness and our helmet of salvation can be polished when we fend off these strongholds that threaten our lives in Christ. May we remember the result of our hard work is eternally compensated: "The pain that you've been feeling cannot compare to the Joy that's coming" (Romans 8:18). May we begin this new year with a constant reminder that our JOY can be refreshed by His Word, the acceptance of our God's faithful love for His people, and the Spirit's promise of renewal each and every day.

Faith Lutheran Council Meeting Minutes Vecember 13, 2023

The meeting was called to order by President Joe Simington at 7:15 PM.

The meeting was opened with prayer by Joe Simington. Chapter 10 of "The Lost Art of Disciple Making" was briefly discussed.

Minutes from October & November's meetings were reviewed. Motion to approve made by Eric Tigges. Pete Crew seconded the motion. Motion carried.

TREASURER'S REPORT – Last week's giving was approximately \$30,000 so we are closing the gap on the budget for the year. Kirby Fueston seconded the motion. Motion carried.

- * **Tech project -** RDI met with Dave, Joe & Jacob One projector, one screen would cost \$61,000. Two projectors & two screens would cost \$80,000. Two projectors and no screens would be \$75,000. Two projectors would put the screens on either side of the cross. This should include most of the labor and we can do some of the construction ourselves. Joe suggested that we bring this to the Congregational forum January 7 along with the budget. He feels we should present this information to them prior to the meeting. There is a specific fund just for the projector & a reserve technology fund that would get us to around \$10,000 we could put towards this project.

NEW BUSINESS

- * **2024 Budget** Looking at doing a 3% raise for staff this year for everyone except Eric & Pastor Ben. Eric's increase will be the payment of seminary and Pastor has asked for an increase in mileage/transportation as his increase. Insurance will be increasing due to the increased value of our building & contents. Community Insurance is currently our agent. Motion made by Eric to upgrade to the \$6.4 million and add the \$1 million umbrella policy. Seconded by Pete Crew. Motion carried. The staff wage increases & insurance increase will add approximately \$2,500 to the budget. Budget for 2024 is currently at \$417,537.44. Pete suggested to give this proposed budget to the Congregation at the January 7 forum.
- * **Advent offering** The Advent meal money is to go into the Fellowship budget. The Advent offering will go to the General Fund as it has in the past. Lenten offerings have gone to Missions in the past.
- * **Next year's Nominating Team -** We need someone that is coming off Council to be on this. It can be Laura (Caring), Larry (Fellowship), Pam (Missions) or Kevin & Heidi (Stewardship).
- * **Zion** Eric Patten is planning on starting seminary part-time in January in Sioux Falls. Greg from Zion is proposing that they would pay for all but \$900/year of this.
