Wanted: Your Prayers!

For several years, our congregation has sent teams to Mexico City. With a ministry that began in that city's immense garbage dump, we bring the good news of Jesus to poor neighborhoods. While we served there last year with Operation Serve International, more than 100 people prayed to follow Jesus. The ministry's leader invited me to train pastors in a country where Christians are persecuted.

Here at Faith Lutheran Church,
Andrea Crew will share God's Word,
and her experiences in Madagascar,
on October 13. That week I will
worship with 160 pastors who serve
under oppression. Please pray that I
will encourage them in faith and
point them to Christ's wisdom for
their overwhelming circumstances.

In the last few years in their country, for the first time, many Christian churches have been allowed to build a church building, but more than one thousand congregations are still being denied a building permit.

Christians regularly experience discrimination there because they follow Jesus. Social media are monitored, and criticism of the majority religion is not allowed.

Christian men lose their jobs because of their faith or are not hired for good jobs. Christian women are harassed in the street. Christian children are bullied at school.


Rumors that a building has been turned into a church, or an accusation of blasphemy on social media, has led to mob violence. In rare instances, mobs have forced Christians to flee their communities. The government regularly arrests converts to Christianity.

One sister in Christ writes, "I am a Christian now. If I showed you my face, it could cost me my life. Fanatics, or even my own family, would kill me if they saw my picture online and read" that I trust in Jesus.

Some prayer suggestions:

- ·Freedom and funds for pastors to come to the conference
- ·Safety for the participants in the conference
- ·Health, strength and safety for me throughout the trip
- ·Anointing of God's Holy Spirit on me to encourage and teach these brothers and sisters
- ·An open heart to learn from these brothers and sisters

I am deeply grateful to Faith for sending me as your representative to these brothers and sisters in Christ! There is an exception to the commandment "Do not covet." I covet your prayers for me and everyone I will meet on this trip.

With many people going to the fair and farmers getting started in the fields September was a tougher month to find time to get projects accomplished but we still made it happen with our volunteers. We had a Saturday workday and had many volunteers come in to help. We were able to get all the exterior walls replaced that had to be cut out four feet high, all the outlets have been cut out and walls built around the ducts on the east side. JCL Solutions brought in a scrubber for us to use so were able to clean our floors. Ducts have been cleaned so will have to be conscientious about dust control so we don't fill them back up with dust. We have been shutting the systems down every day and running them at night. Sheetrocking has begun and they are doing an awesome job.









With that we had a work night insulating interior walls which went very quickly with our volunteers and had treats afterwards thanks to Pam! We will need to continue to insulate for noise reduction as they get one side of the walls done. So will have more work nights as we go along.

We could really use a clean up crew to help keep our church as clean as possible while going through this building spree. If you feel this is something you would be willing to help with please let Pam, Justin or myself know.

Highlands (Song of Ascent)



Imagine, for a moment, you lived with the Israelites at some point during the Old Testament. There, 'church' - which is approximately equivalent to worship at the tabernacle - only happened for the average person a few times a year, during the annual feasts. This was a cornerstone of their culture, as sojourners from all over Israel would travel to Jerusalem to be in the presence of God. If you lived in such a time, where you traveled for days to seek God's presence, how would your relationship with God change? How far would you travel if your only chance of experiencing God was by searching far and wide?




The song 'Highlands (Song of Ascent)' by Hillsong UNITED is based loosely off the Psalms of Ascent - Psalms 120-134 which all contain the theme of 'going up' to Jerusalem, to dwell with God. These 15 psalms are fairly short, containing just over 100 verses altogether, but pack in the real emotions of a people dealing with everyday struggles, yet earnestly desiring and seeking the face of God. Is your desire for God as unquenchable as it was during the time of these psalmists? Now, of course, we have access to the very presence of God not only at church, but wherever we may go. However, it is often helpful to remind ourselves of the importance of seeking God and carving out both time and space with which to do so. The song 'Highlands' contains beautiful imagery of both searching for God and realizing that God is worthy of worship wherever we may find ourselves. Consider the profound lyrics of the chorus: "No less God within the shadows; No less faithful when the night leads me astray; 'Cause You're the heaven where my heart is; In the highlands and the heartache all the same." This song contains lyrics so profound, it may be worth listening to more than once so that the meaning can sink into your heart. As you listen, picture yourself on a pilgrimage to experience God. He's waiting for you.

Reducing Stigma about Mental Illness

In October, and especially during Mental Illness Awareness Week (Oct. 6-12), information is shared to reduce confusion and encourage understanding of mental illness. Since it is a common occurrence, (1 in 5 Americans have a diagnosable mental health condition) there's a need to tackle the myths that circulate about mental illness. Perhaps, you have heard the stigmatizing messages that mental illness is a sign of weakness, a sin, or a passive set of circumstances that should just "be prayed away"?

Having difficulties coping at various times in life is a burden to us all. For many of us, the events of this past summer are painfully taking their toll on our mental, physical, and spiritual well-being. We wonder if we can reclaim our peace as we survive the trauma, hardship, and grief we are feeling. Our resilience is being tested in ways we never thought possible. For some, valuable lessons about facing adversity together have led to more reliance on family, friends, neighbors, and other community members. For others, the loneliness and lack of support are evident and discouraging. If you need some relief, maybe it's time to reach out for help to your doctor, pastor, or a trusted friend or family member to get back on track.

Counselors, like Restorations Ministries, may be another avenue to confidentially share the turmoil you are enduring when depression, anxiety, changes in sleep, appetite, or feelings of hopelessness linger for longer periods. When experiencing risks of self-harm, immediate attention is needed. Sharing these private concerns now may be far less detrimental to your health than bottling them up and developing other stress-related illnesses that can adversely affect you.

Our church can be a light to the darkness mental illness can bring. However, we must guard ourselves against Stigma, which promotes isolation if we fear exposure to others' judgment and criticism when we aren't doing well. Especially with the struggles of more severe and persistent mental illnesses, like schizophrenia, bipolar disorder, clinical depression, and personality disorders, stigma can stoke feelings of inadequacy that erode one's self-confidence to participate in relationships and activities.

As Christians, our Lord has outfitted us with His armor to give us strength. God's Word tells us many times that, as Christians, we must be prepared and equipped for battle. We have access to and use of the Belt of Truth, the Breastplate of Righteousness, the Shoes of Peace, the Shield of Faith, the Helmet of Salvation, and the Sword of the Spirit (Ephesians 6:14-17) to deliver us.

We can also use this "equipment" to lift up each other with the Hope of God's grace. Since we are more similar than different, we can remind each other through our respect, the sharing of kind words of reassurance, and thoughtful gestures of care and concern that we are all God's children, in need of His peace, presence, and protection. Let's help each other navigate this world together. To God Be the Glory!






Upcoming Bible Studies
